The Big Vision

A community-based behavioral health treatment system that is responsive to all individuals with mental health and substance abuse disorders and skilled in serving those with histories of justice involvement.

Mental Health is Health

Both mental illness and addiction are real medical conditions, just like diabetes, cancer, or heart disease. They are diseases of the brain that can be appropriately diagnosed and treated.

Even with illnesses that many once thought untreatable we know that treatment and recovery are possible.

We are wasting tax payer dollars.

Right now individuals with untreated mental illness are being incarcerated at alarming rates. This not only strains public resources but makes recovery harder for the individual.

Rather than institutionalizing those with mental illness we should treat their disease so that they can be productive citizens.

Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration **GAINS Center Recommendations**

Pre-Booking Jail Diversion

To keep individuals with mental illness and co-occurring disorders in the community rather than in the criminal justice system

Institutional Services

To provide constitutionally adequate services in correctional facilities for people with mental illness and co-occurring disorders who need to be in the criminal justice system due to severity of their crime

Re-entry Transition

To link people with mental illness and co-occurring disorders to community based services upon discharge

Advantages to Community Treatment

Maintaining relationships with family and friends in the community

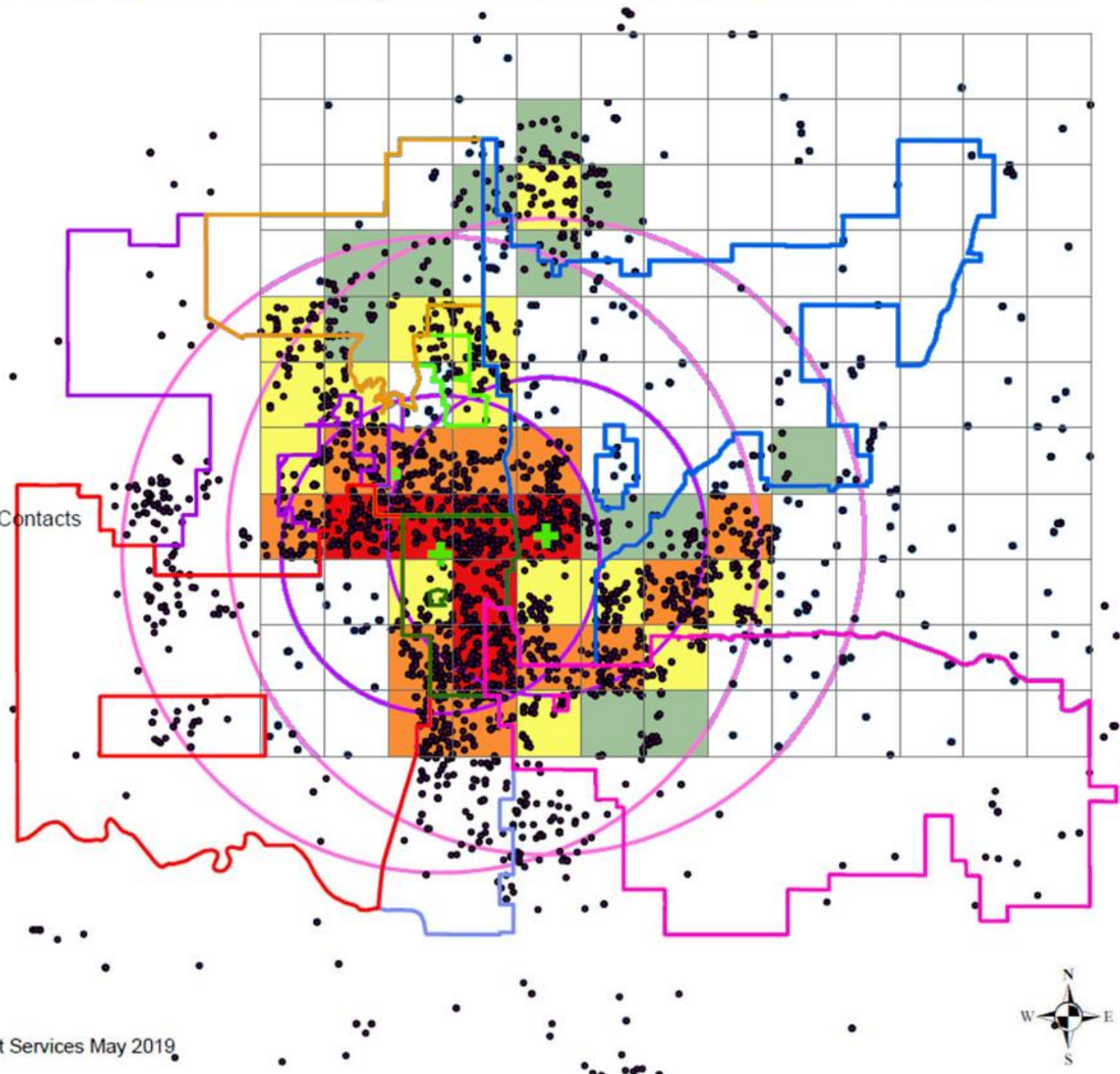
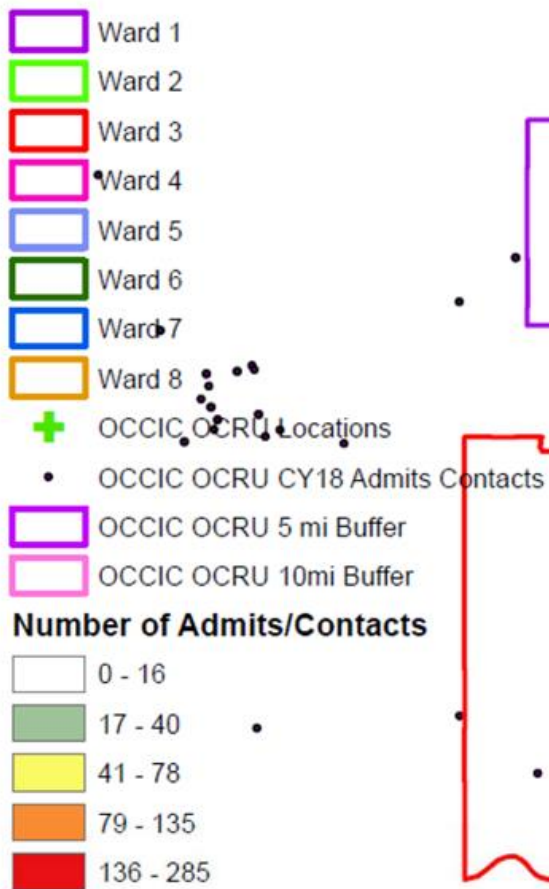
Care providers are more likely to be familiar with individual histories

Discharge planning is done by a person familiar with the community and its possible resources or assistance

Shorter lengths of stay in in-patient treatment

Less time in protective custody, less trauma for the consumer, fewer resources used by law enforcement

Crisis Centers in Oklahoma County with Number of Admits/Contacts



Right now there are two crisis centers that serve all of Oklahoma City and the surrounding areas. They each have 16 beds.

Oftentimes these beds are full so officers have to drive across the state to find a safe bed. This inefficiency takes our officers off-duty and exposes them to a more dangerous situation.

Safety for Law Enforcement

In June of 2019

1,628 mental health calls were received by OKCPD

804 people in crisis were transported by a law enforcement officer

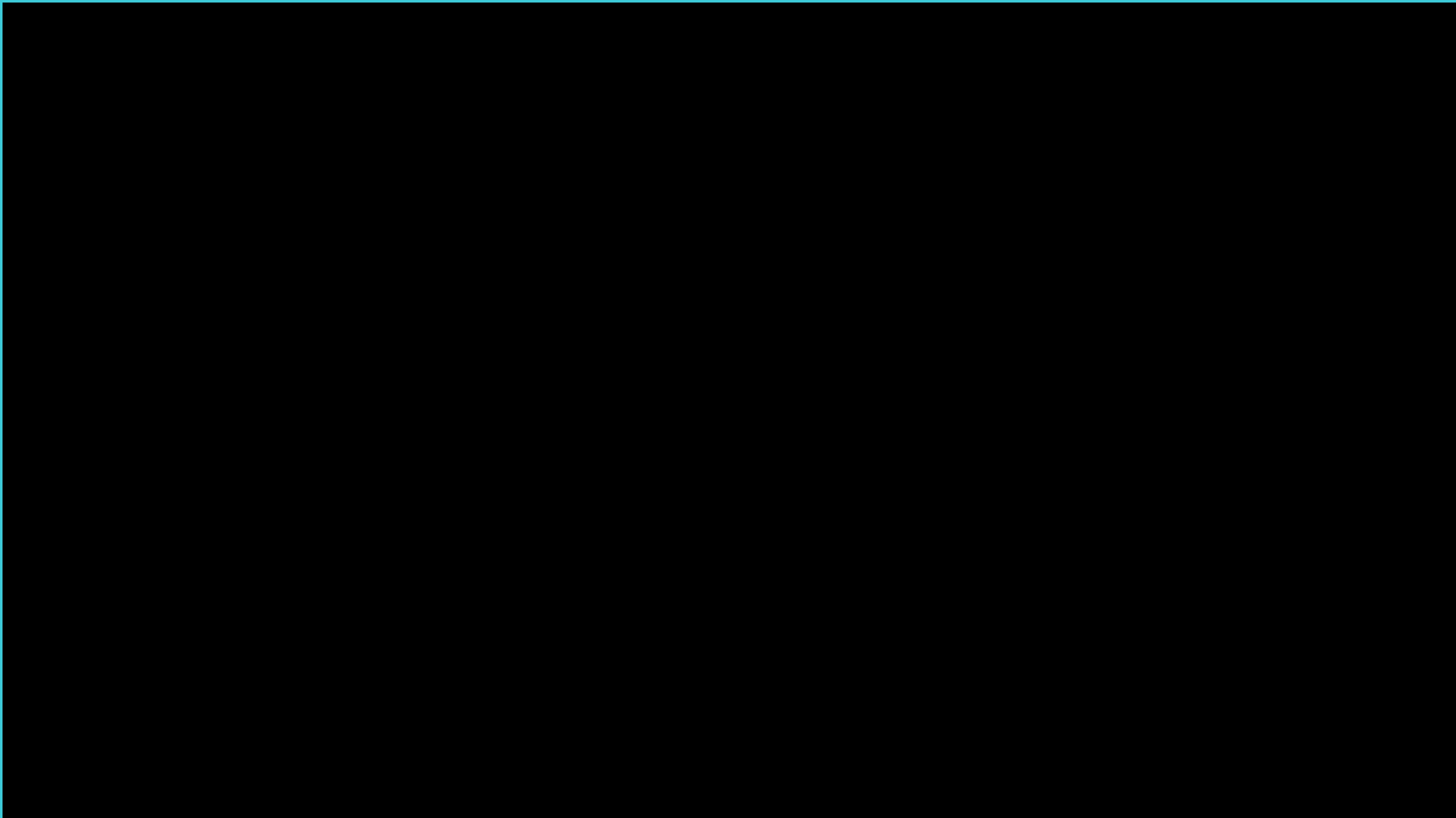
Law enforcement officers traveled to **24** different locations to find safe beds

22 people died as a result of a psychiatric illness

Oklahoma City's Restoration Center

An integrated clinic where people can receive psychiatric care, substance abuse services, general health care, and access to wrap around services. This facility will give law enforcement officers another safe space to take those in crisis.

- 16 Crisis beds
- Medical Detox
- Methamphetamine Detox
- Medication Assisted Treatment for Opioids
- Medical Clinic
- Mobile Crisis Outreach Team
- Pharmacy
- Temporary Supportive Housing
- Public Inebriate Alternative
- Wrap-around Services & Case Management



How is a Restoration Center different than Palomar and the Diversion Hub?

The Restoration Center will be a medical facility that is not directly tied to the criminal justice system. It will serve anyone who walks in the door, regardless of their justice involvement.

It will be a building full of doctors and nurses, not lawyers and judges.

Crisis Intervention Centers

Crisis Intervention Centers provide assessment, detoxification, crisis de-escalation, respite, counseling, medications and adequate sleep so that a person can return to a state of restored health.

Building a support system in the community with services, friends and family is an important component as well.

Single Site Supportive Housing

30 units of transitional housing for homeless individuals being discharged from crisis centers. This site would include 24 hour wrap around services to help homeless individuals with severe mental illness transition to permanent housing.

Saving Tax Payer Dollars

Each of these proposed facilities will save Oklahoma City residents tax dollars. Crisis centers will prevent individuals from being incarcerated. Long term wrap around services will prevent them from ending up in the emergency room. And supportive housing will keep them from experiencing homelessness.

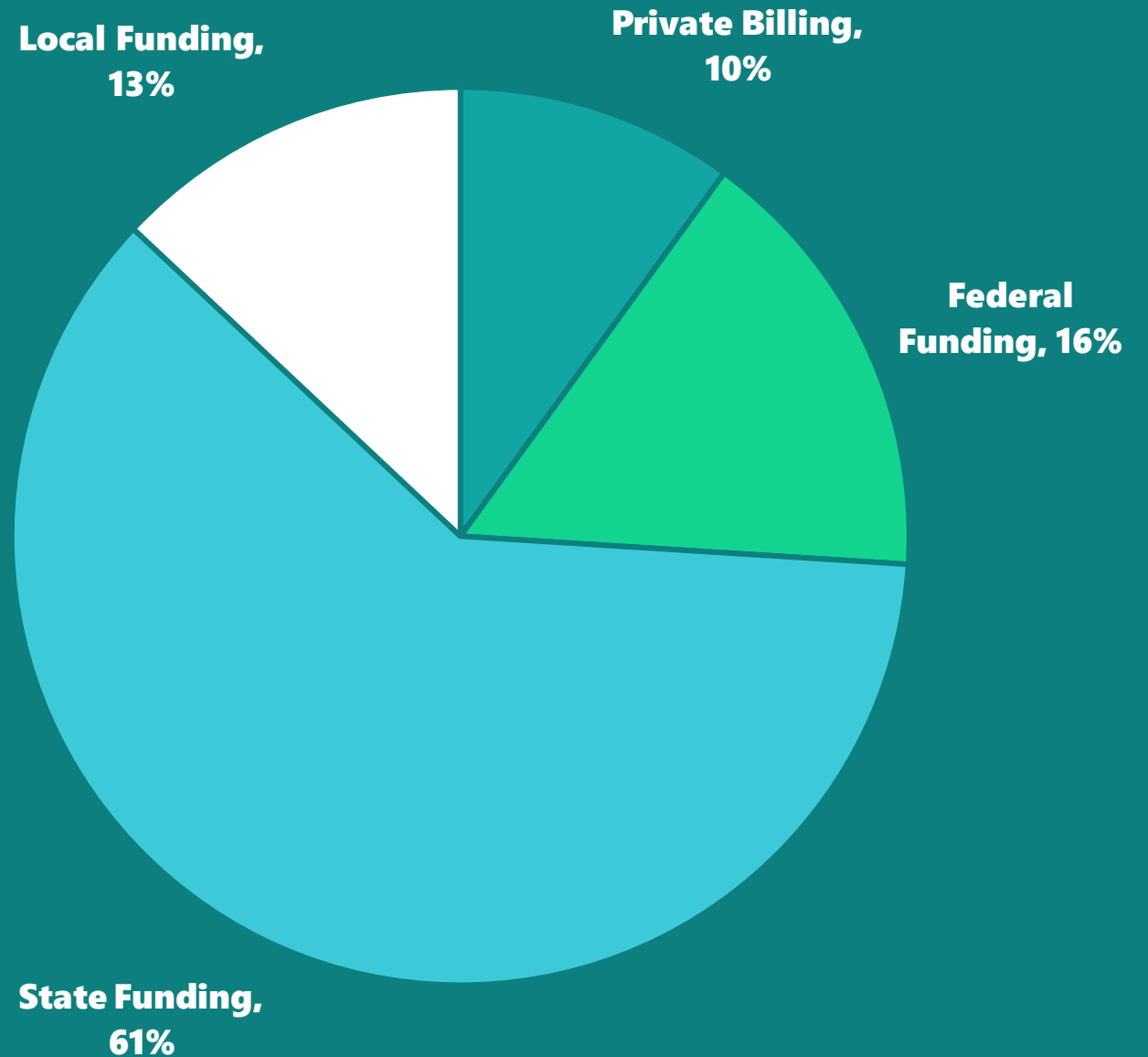
Requested Funding

Two Crisis Centers	\$10.8 million
Restoration Center	\$24.5 million
Mental Health Housing	\$6.7 million
Total Requested Funding	\$42 million

Projected Annual Operating Expenses

Two Crisis Centers	\$5 million*
Restoration Center	\$13.6 million
Mental Health Housing	\$0.6 million
Total	\$19.2 million
