- Bonds are repaid over 20 years
- Bonds are repaid through property taxes







- 48 projects to widen arterial streets (\$168.9M).








Pavement Condition Index (PCI) Map








Streets Map

- Equipment and technology upgrades.







With a general purpose of

"guiding and accomplishing a coordinated, adjusted, and harmonious development of the municipality and its environs which will best promote in accordance with present and future needs"



OKLAHOMA STATE STATUTE §11-47-107 Purposes of the plan

The plan shall include, among other things,

- adequate provision for traffic
- the promotion of **safety** from fire and other dangers
- the promotion of healthful and convenient distribution of **population**
- the promotion of good civic design and arrangement
- wise and efficient expenditure of public funds



OKLAHOMA STATE STATUTE §11-47-107 Purposes of the plan

In preparation of the plan

"shall make careful and comprehensive surveys and studies of present conditions and future growth of the municipality and with due regard to its relation to neighboring territory."



600,000 people live in Oklahoma City today. **300,000** & **170,000** People Jobs

will be added to OKC by 2050. That is equivalent to adding 4 Edmonds or 3 Normans to our current population.












Growth Scenario Analysis


Low to Moderate Income or Transit Dependent Households
