

Notes

- Facts about the history of the Freedom Center (building) located at 2609 N. Martin Luther King Ave., Oklahoma City.
- Circa 1945 built as a Mobil gas station
- · Clara Luper was a teacher, historian, civil rights activists
- 1958 1964 led successful sit-ins in downtown OKC businesses
- 1965 Freedom Center, Inc. (FCI) was created
- In 1967 FCI under Mrs. Luper's leadership, arrangements were made to acquire 2609 N. MLK building and property
- The building became home to the NAACP Youth Council
- Served as organizing hub for fair housing, and other protest marches
- "Serve as an educational and motivation center for culturally disadvantaged children", said Mrs. Luper
- 1968 fire nearly destroyed center...no one ever charged w/the arson.
- 1969 Mayor Ron Norick appointed the "Mayor's United citizens Committee for the Reconstruction of the NAACP Youth Council Freedom Center"
- 1969 Lieutenant Governor Nigh spoke at groundbreaking ceremony
- 1970 an open house was held in a refurbished building
- Over next 50 years continued serving as vital resource to young and old alike, providing training/education classes; mentoring programs; voter registration drives, fundraising campaigns and community meetings
- · 2011 Freedom Center doors closed permanently
- Building vacant and in deteriorating condition since that time

- 2018 property placed under court receivership (Leonard Benton, Receiver)
- 2019 reconstituted Freedom Center BofD develops twophase plan to restore and preserve existing building
- Property received Historic Landmark Designation (City of OKC)
- · Building not ready for occupancy yet (insurance issues)
- Board of Directors requests the plan be included in MAPS4 program initiative
- The goal is to create a cultural environment that educates the public about the history of civil rights struggles in Oklahoma City
- An endowment is included in the request to ensure long term sustainability of the center.
- The vision of this project will transform 3 blocks of blight into a beautifully landscaped campus of public activity
- Conceptual masterplan envisions a campus design that incorporates the existing buildings as a part of the overall plan which will include a new state-of-the-art 10,000sf Smithsonian museum caliber structure and 7,500 sq ft multipurpose education and event center to be named the:

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
