HISTORY

Existing shelter founded on July 1, 1949, when a \$35,000 gift, a house, and 17-acre land parcel at Trosper Park was donated by Mrs. J.H. Smith to the Oklahoma City Humane Society (first formed in 1915 at this Mesta Park house, right, located at 927 Northwest 16th Street)





Under leadership of Patience Latting, in the early 1970s, the humane society turned operations over to the City of OKC, under purview of Oklahoma City Zoo, with goal to improve reputation and best practices.

HISTORY









In 1995, construction on a new facility







The existing building was designed with 37 spaces for adoptions. The shelter averages 100-120 dogs available for adoption.

PUBLIC AREA

SAFETY

- Too small for number of visitors shelter receives (approx. 90,000/yr)
- No designated area for intake exam
- Dogs and cats in same room

COMFORT

- Too Stressful
- Too Loud
- Unwelcoming



ANIMAL CONTROL PROGRAM

- 19 field officers but no designated work space
- No area for officers to interview or speak with citizens regarding cases



VETERINARY SERVICES

- Clinic area too small to accommodate staff
- Need designated area for x-ray
- Need proper diagnostic area for bloodwork and microscope
- Need incoming patient holding area
- Need Pre and Post-op holding area




ANIMAL HOLDING

- Need proper flooring
- Need more and larger kennels
- Need proper isolation areas
- Need outside play areas
- Layout is not public friendly
- Need shelter-friendly construction materials





PROPOSED NEW SHELTER




- A building that incorporates all modern knowledge on animal sheltering best practices
