Heat equipment safety

Home and apartment fires are more common during the winter because of improperly used heating equipment, fireplaces and candles. Be sure anything that can burn is at least three feet away from fireplaces or space heaters. Fireplaces should be inspected by a professional every year and cleaned when necessary, and make sure fires are fully extinguished before you go to bed. It's important your home has working smoke alarms and your family knows how to escape a fire safely.



CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON LOWER SCISSORTAIL PARK

Construction is under way on Scissortail Park's 30-acre Lower Park in the heart of Oklahoma City. The Upper Park opened in 2019, and the Lower Park is scheduled to open in 2022. The Lower Park will have more open and natural spaces, with a focus on space for athletic events and pickup sports. Paths and pavers will dot a promenade alongside whispering pines, native gardens, a hollow, an overlook hill and a plaza, with a play area for children. The 40-acre Upper Park extends south from Oklahoma City Boulevard to Interstate 40. The Skydance Bridge connects it to the Lower Park, which extends to SW 15th Street on the north shore of the Oklahoma River. The total project budget is \$132 million, funded debt-free by MAPS 3. Council elections Feb. 9

Voters in Wards 1, 3, 4 and 7 will vote in a nonpartisan primary election Feb. 9 to decide who represents them on the City Council for the next four-year term. Visit okc.gov/WardMap for a Ward map. There's a runoff in April if no candidate gets a majority of the votes in their Ward during the primary. The City Council has nine members: the Mayor, who is elected citywide, and one member from each of Oklahoma City's eight Wards. Winterize your pipes

Winter weather means it's time to weather-proof your water lines and irrigation system. Water expands when it freezes, which can cause breaks in your plumbing lines. Here are a few easy ways to keep your pipes safe throughout the winter.

- Check for leaks before temperatures drop.
- · Keep cabinet doors open for kitchen or bathroom pipes along exterior walls.
- · Never set your thermostat below 55 degrees, even when you leave the house.
- Turn off your irrigation system.
- · Disconnect water hoses and insulate outdoor water spigots using a foam cover (found at hardware stores).
- · Water lawns only during long dry periods when temperatures are above freezing.
- Use 2-4 inches of mulch to protect plants.


Tree and limb debris

There are three ways to dispose of tree and limb debris from the ice storm: curbside collection, free landfill days and - for rural residents only – burn permits. Residential trash collection customers can cut the limbs into sections no longer than 10 feet and stack them on the curb, away from water meters and obstructions, and off the sidewalk and street. Contract crews will make one pickup pass by January, and a second by March. You can also take limbs to one of four participating landfills for free every Saturday through Jan. 2. And rural residents can get a permit from the Fire Marshal's Office to burn debris on certain days. It's illegal to dump debris in parks. Visit okc.gov/ice for details.

New park amenities

Work has started on the new Willa D. Johnson Recreation Center at Frederick Douglass Park in northeast Oklahoma City, and the new Oklahoma Medal of Honor Memorial is open at Manuel Perez Park on the south side. The recreation center, named for former Ward 7 Councilwoman Willa Johnson, will replace the current community center built in 1926. The Medal of Honor Memorial honors all Oklahomans who earned the military's highest honor for valor, including OKC native Manuel Perez in 1943. For details visit okc.gov/parks.

Charter amendments

OKC residents voted to approve all nine proposed amendments to the City Charter in November. The amendments modernized wording, addressed inconsistencies and resolved discrepancies with state law. Buying a home?

Eligible potential homebuyers may qualify for up to \$15,000 in assistance from Oklahoma City's HOME Down Payment Assistance (DPA) program. DPA is for income-qualified people and families looking to buy generally south of Britton Road, north of SW/SE 89th Street, west of Bryant Avenue and east of Meridian Avenue. You must qualify for lender financing. Income limits are based on taxable, not gross, household income, so contact the provider to see if you qualify (see below). Christmas tree disposal

The City will pick up your Christmas tree on your monthly bulk waste collection day, not with your regular weekly trash or ice storm debris. Place the tree on your curb no more than three days before your bulk waste collection day. Keep your Christmas tree separate from your ice storm debris pile. Go to okc.gov/mytrashday to find out your bulk waste collection day. You can also recycle bare, live trees instead of sending them to the landfill. Pine needles make mulch for outdoor plants, and small branches can be shredded or added to a compost bin.
