Bulky waste reminder

Your monthly bulky waste pickup day lets you get rid of household items that are too big for your Big Blue trash cart. The first 4 cubic yards (about the size of two refrigerators) are included in your monthly service fee. Customers who set out more than 4 cubic yards may be charged an excess bulky fee on their next utility bill. Bagged waste will not be picked up and needs to be placed inside your trash cart. Make sure your bulky waste pile is clear from obstructions like mailboxes, trees, or vehicles. Do not cover your water meter. For your collection date, check your utility bill, or visit okcutilities.com or okc.gov/mytrashday. Please allow three days for crews to pick up your bulky waste.

Better Streets, Safer City

More than half of the \$261 million sales tax component of the Better Streets, Safer City program has been allocated to construction so far, with 119 miles of resurfaced streets among highlights of progress in 2020. About 119 miles of streets were resurfaced with the program's sales tax funds. The bond-funded portion of the program includes hundreds of millions of dollars more. The sales tax funding paid for 21 miles of sidewalk construction in 2020, plus about 10 miles of trails and four miles of bike lanes. Construction on sales tax-funded projects is likely to last another two years, with construction on bond-funded projects extending beyond 2027. Visit okc.gov/BetterSafer for more.

New Council terms

Newly elected Ward 1 Councilman Bradley Carter and Ward 3 Councilwoman Barbara Young joined re-elected Ward 4 Councilman Todd Stone and Ward 7 Councilwoman Nikki Nice in taking the oath of office April 13 to begin four-year City Council terms. Councilwoman Young and Councilman Carter won the April 6 runoff elections, succeeding Council members who didn't seek re-election. Councilman Stone was re-elected with a majority victory in the Feb. 10 primary election, and Councilwoman Nice was unopposed. The Mayor and one representative from each of the City's eight Wards make up the nine-member City Council, which is nonpartisan. They serve parttime at the head of the City's Council-Manager form of government. The Mayor's annual salary is \$24,000, and Council members' annual salary is \$12,000. Wait 'til 8

If your pet is expecting a litter of puppies or kittens this spring, "Wait 'til 8" and help save their lives by keeping them with their mother for eight weeks. Puppies and kittens are more likely to survive their youth if they stay with their mothers for the first six weeks of life, plus an extra two weeks so they've grown enough to be spayed or neutered and placed into a new home. Clean their space regularly and make sure the mother dog or cat is taken care of, and she can raise the newborns more or less on her own for eight weeks. The puppies and kittens need their mothers' help to learn social skills and avoid infections. After eight weeks, they can be evaluated by the Animal Welfare team, spayed or neutered and placed for adoption. Animal Welfare is celebrating Adopt-a-Cat Month in June. All month long, fees are waived for adoptions of cats older than 6 months and discounted to \$30 for kitten adoptions. Top bond rating

Moody's Investors Service and S&P Global Ratings have each affirmed the City's topnotch bond rating and stable long-term outlook. In separate reports in March, Moody's affirmed the City's Aaa rating and stable outlook and S&P affirmed its AAA rating and stable outlook. The triple-A ratings are the highest awarded by each agency. It's the 11th year in a row OKC achieved the highest rating. The ratings are used to price bonds that the City sells to fund infrastructure investments. The ratings keep Oklahoma City in an elite group of major American municipalities with the highest possible rating.

Fight mosquitoes

Mosquito-borne illnesses are a threat in OKC every spring and summer. The OKC-County Health Department recommends draining standing water on your property so mosquitoes won't breed nearby. To keep mosquitoes away, use insect repellent on clothing and exposed skin. Dress in long sleeves and pants.
