# 2021 Oklahoma City Police Services Survey

## Executive Summary



### Purpose and Methodology

**Overview.** During the fall of 2021, ETC Institute administered a police survey to residents living in Oklahoma City. The purpose of the survey was to gather input and feedback to better understand the expectations residents have regarding the Police Department and police interactions. The results will help inform recommendations to the City Council on how police officers should respond to 9-1-1 calls and other situations that may arise in Oklahoma City.

**Methodology.** A three-page survey was mailed to a random sample of households in Oklahoma City. The mailed survey included a postage-paid return envelope and a cover letter. The cover letter explained the purpose of the survey and encouraged residents to return their surveys in the mail. Residents were also given the option of completing the survey online or by phone.

The goal was to receive at least 1,200 completed surveys. This goal was far exceeded, with a total of 1,644 households completing a survey. The results for the random sample of 1,644 households have a 95% level of confidence with a precision of at least +/- 2.4%.

The percentage of “don’t know” responses has been excluded from many of the graphs shown in this report, but has been provided in the tabular data section. When the “don’t know” responses have been excluded, the text of this report will indicate that the responses have been excluded with the phrase “who had an opinion.”

### Major Findings

- Eighty-three percent (83%) of respondents indicated they feel “very safe” or “safe” in their neighborhood during the day; 14% feel “somewhat safe,” and only 2% feel “unsafe” or “very unsafe” in their neighborhood during the day. Sixty-one percent (61%) of respondents indicated they feel “very safe” or “safe” in their neighborhood at night; 29% feel “somewhat safe,” and 10% indicated they feel “unsafe” or “very unsafe” in their neighborhood at night.

## Executive Summary



- Eighty-one percent (81%) of respondents who had an opinion indicated they are “very likely” or “likely” to provide information about criminal activity in their neighborhood to the police; 8% are “somewhat likely,” and 11% are “unlikely” or “very unlikely” to provide information about criminal activity in their neighborhood to the police.
- Eighteen percent (18%) of respondents who had an opinion indicated they had been stopped by a police officer in Oklahoma City while walking, in a vehicle, or on a bike during the past year. Of the 18% who had been stopped, 73% who had an opinion indicated the officer clearly explained the reason for the stop, and 57% who had an opinion felt the officer listened “very carefully” or “somewhat carefully” to their concerns, explanation, or version of events. When respondents were asked if they thought certain factors contributed to the reason that they were stopped by a police officer, 23% thought it was due to race, 15% believed gender was a contributing factor, and 14% thought it was due to ethnicity.
- When asked if they had interacted with anyone from the Oklahoma City Police Department during the past year for various other reasons, 19% indicated they had interacted with police at events or a public meeting; 17% interacted with police to report a crime or suspicious behavior, and 16% called 911 for an emergency.
- Seventy-seven percent (77%) of respondents who had an opinion either “strongly agree” or “agree” that Oklahoma City police officers with whom they have had the most contact are generally fair and unbiased; 75% who had an opinion agree that during their most recent request for assistance from OKCPD, the officer(s) adequately addressed their concerns.
- Sixty-two percent (62%) who had an opinion were “very satisfied” or “satisfied” with their interaction(s) with the Oklahoma City Police Department; 20% were “neutral,” 9% were “dissatisfied” and 10% were “very dissatisfied” with their interaction(s) with the Police Department.
- When respondents were asked their level of support for various de-escalation initiatives, 94% who had an opinion were “very supportive” or “supportive” of increasing community training and public education on how residents should call for emergency situations that involve a mental health crisis. Ninety-four percent (94%) who had an opinion were “very supportive” or “supportive” of increasing training for Oklahoma City Police Department leaders in mental illness engagement. No fewer than 87% were supportive of any of the five de-escalation initiatives listed on the survey.

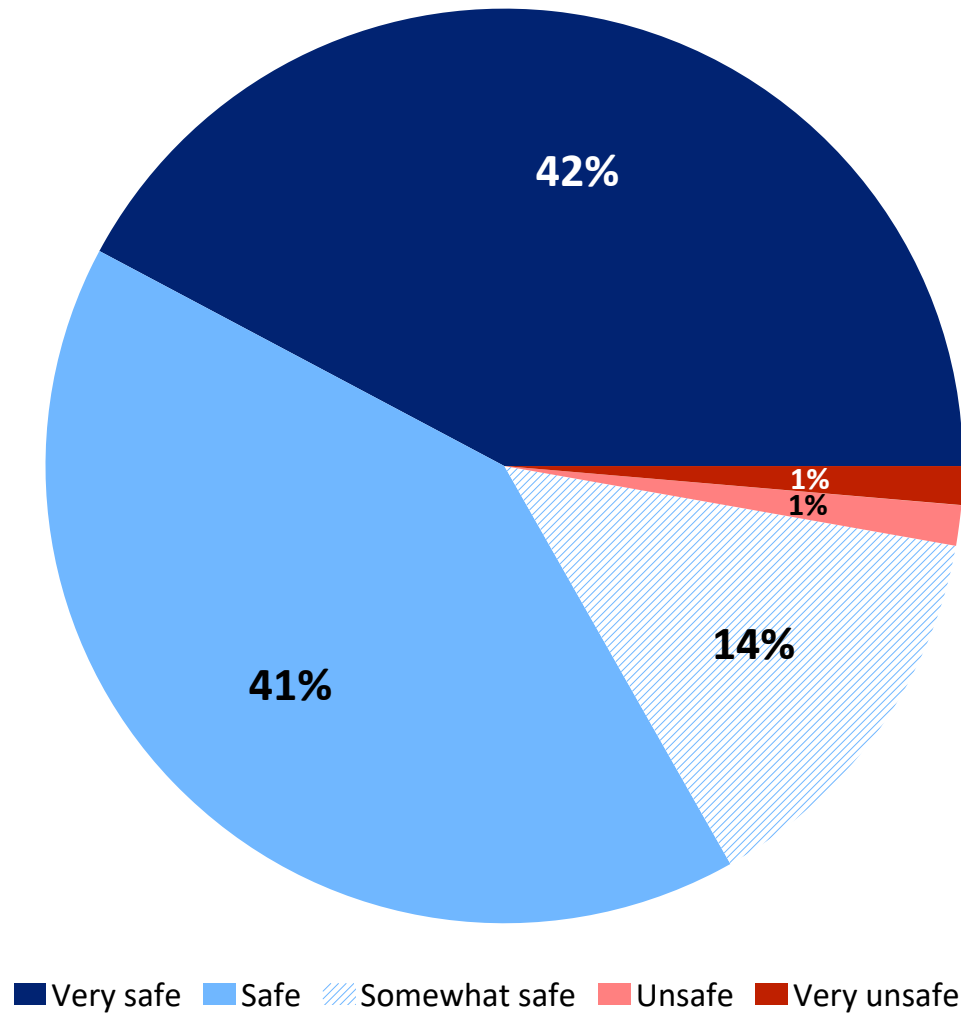
- When respondents were asked their level of support for various accountability initiatives, 94% who had an opinion were “very supportive” or “supportive” of the OKCPD shortening the waiting period for interviewing officers who have been involved in an officer-involved shooting or use of force incident. Ninety-four percent (94%) who had an opinion were supportive of OKCPD and the City actively beginning public education processes that give citizens a clear understanding of how they may make a formal complaint against OKCPD and its employees. Ninety-two percent (92%) who had an opinion were supportive of OKCPD prohibiting officers from viewing video evidence before providing an interview in critical events, such as officer-involved shootings.

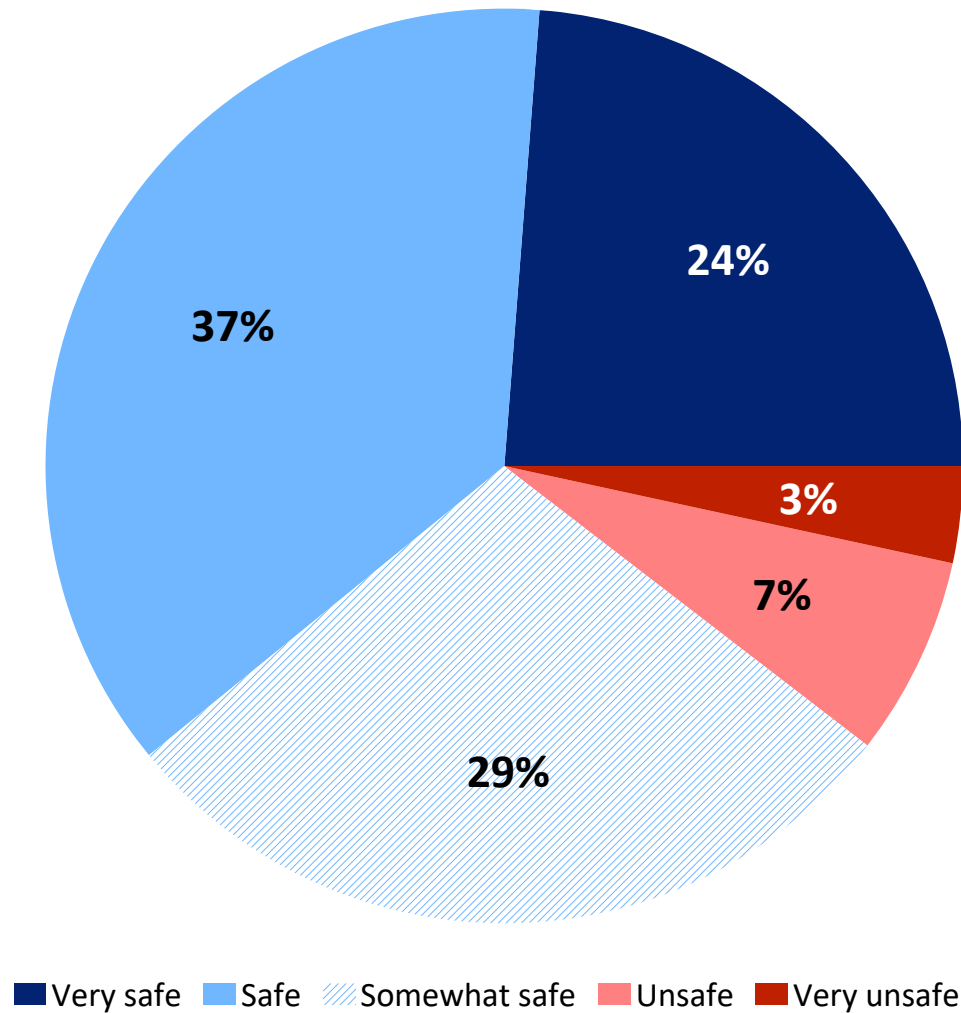

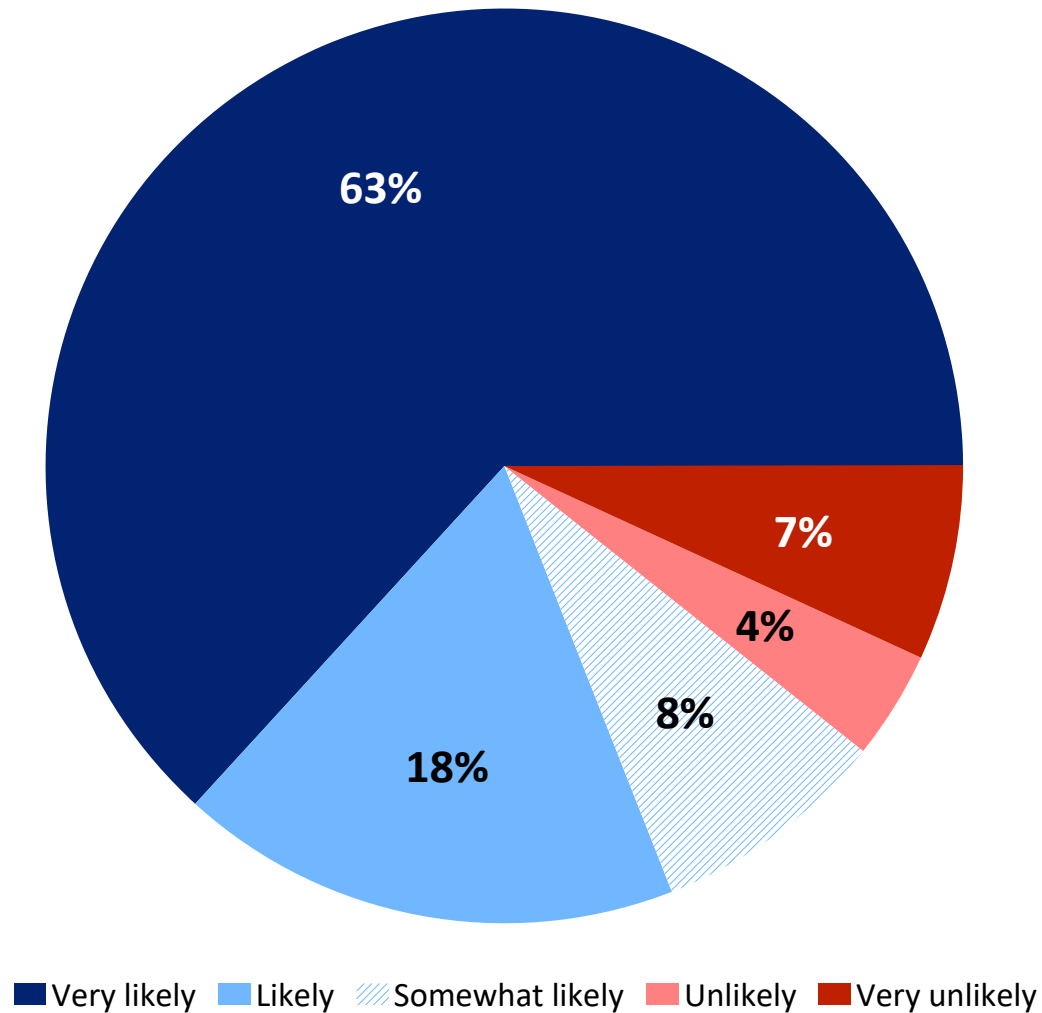
## Q2. How safe do you feel in your neighborhood at NIGHT?

by percentage of respondents



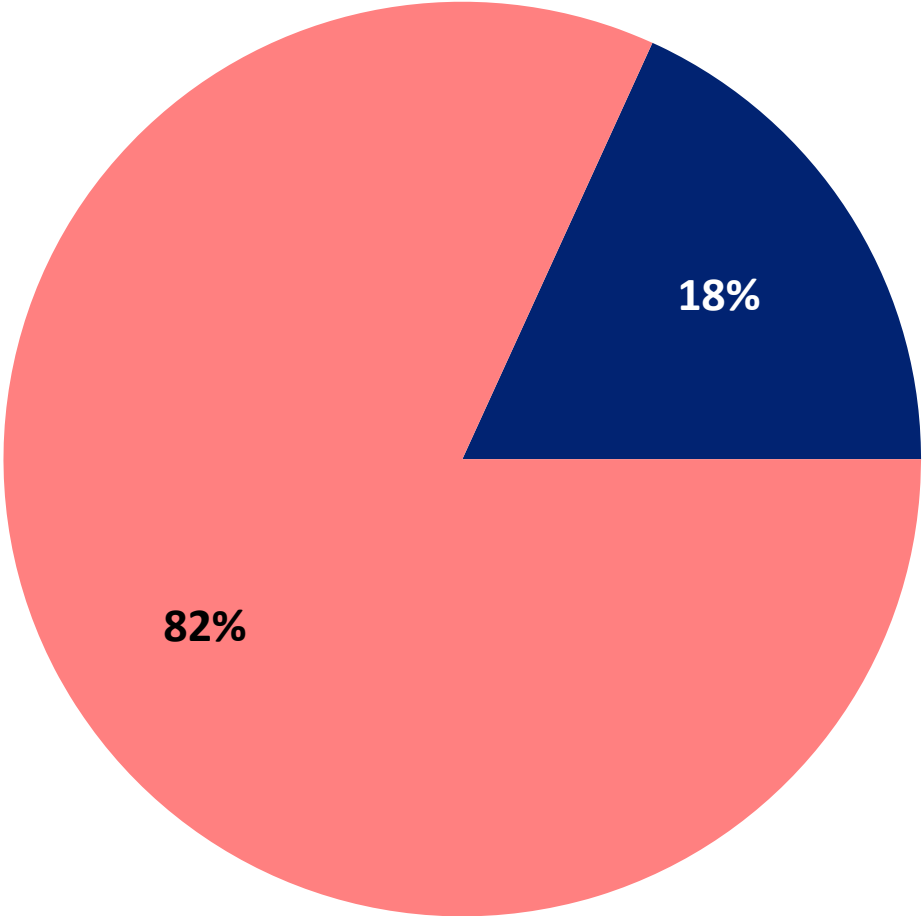
# Q3. How likely are you to provide information about criminal activity in your neighborhood to the police?

# Q4. Have you been stopped by a police officer in Oklahoma City while walking, in a vehicle, or on your bike during the past year?

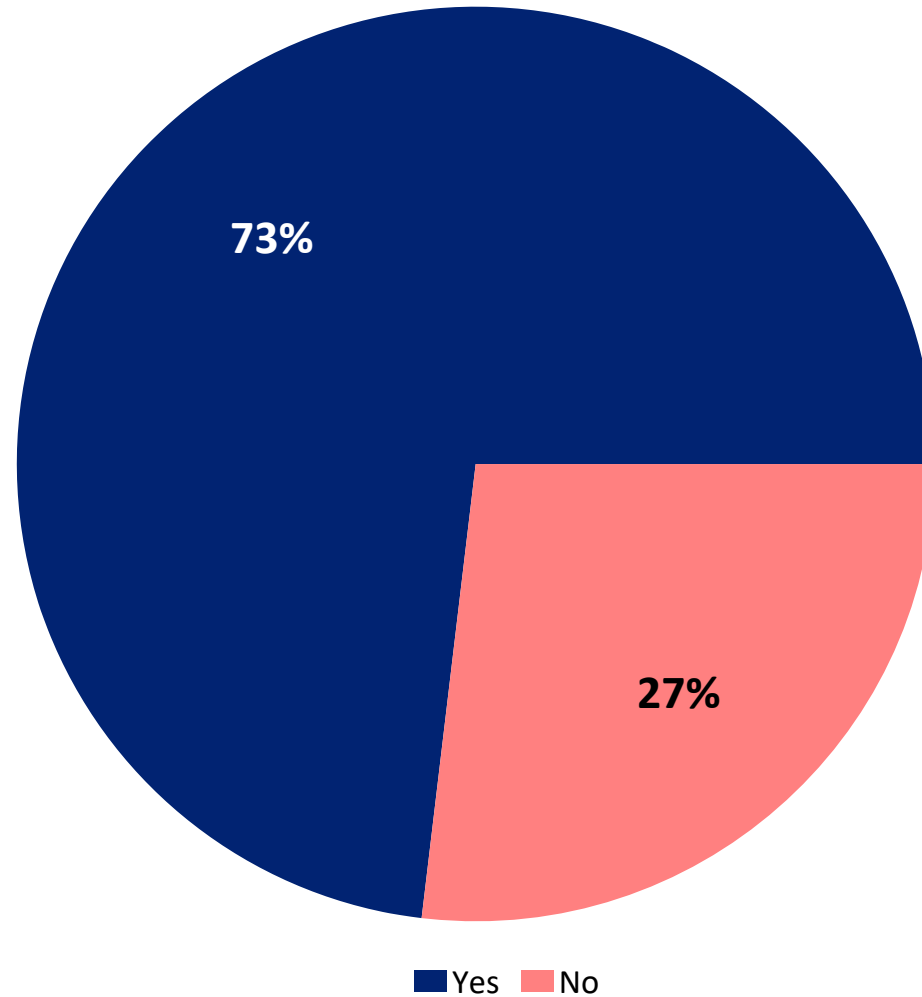

# Q4a. Did the officer clearly explain the reason for the stop?

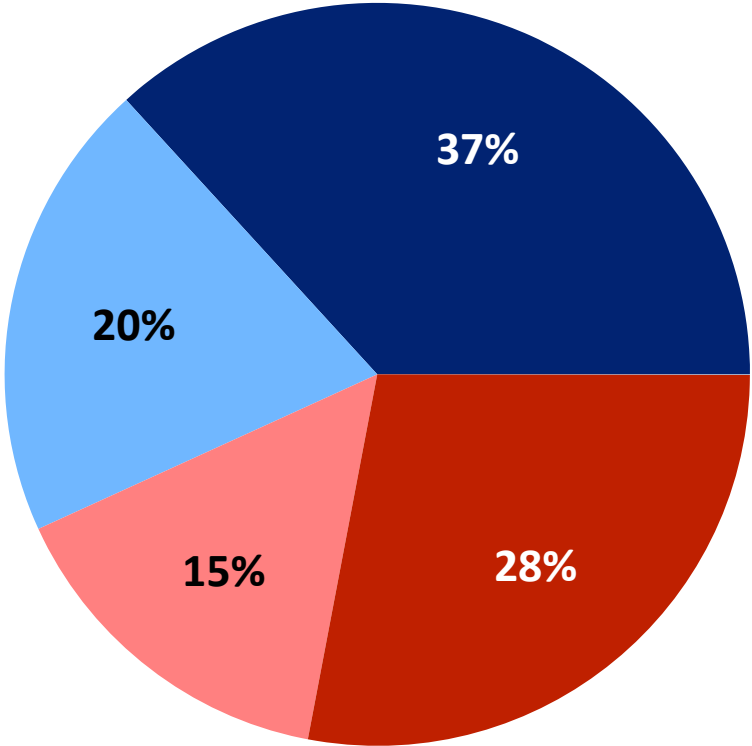
by percentage of respondents who indicated they had been stopped by a police officer during the past year (excluding “don’t remember”)

by percentage of respondents who indicated they had been stopped by a police officer during the past year (excluding “don’t remember”)

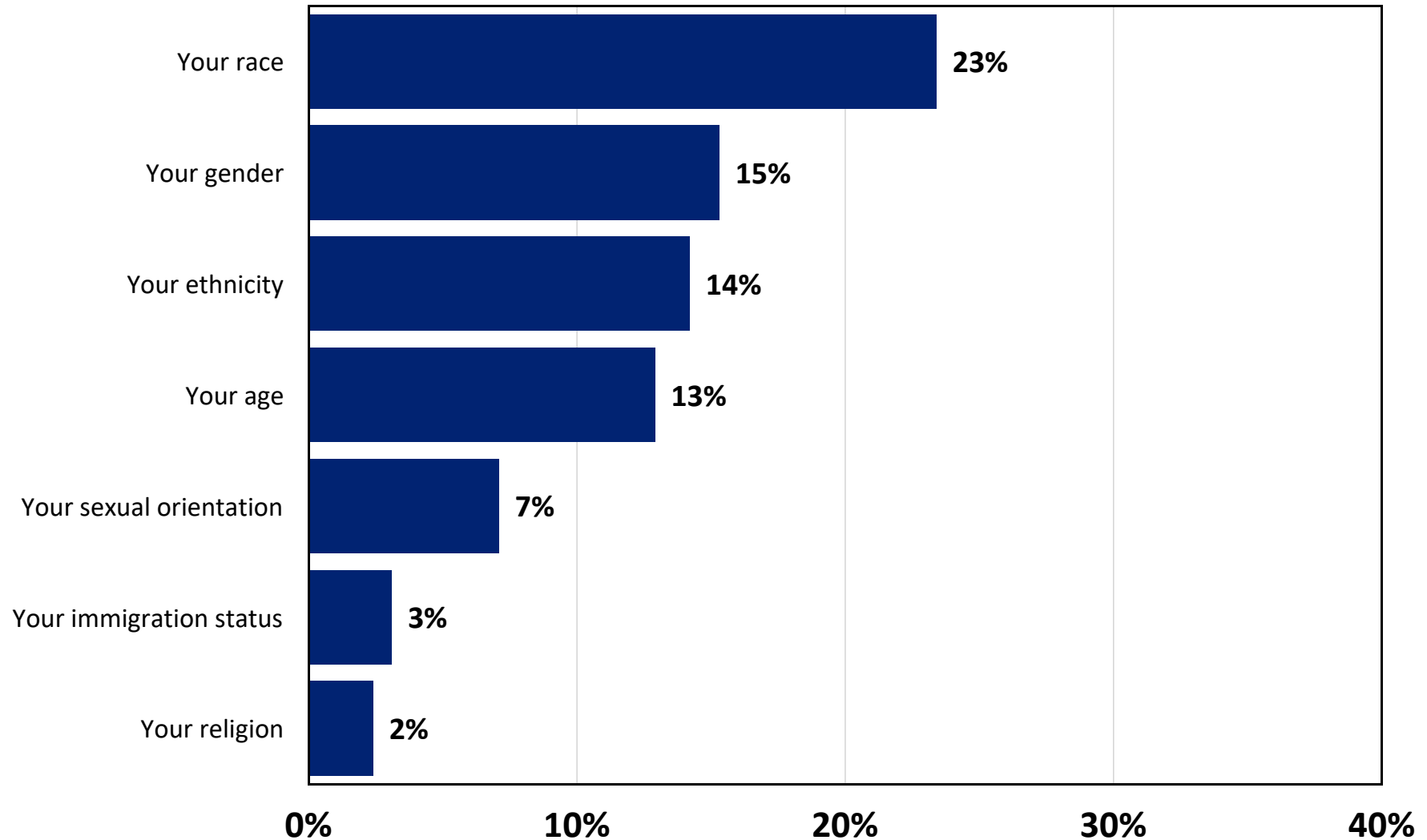

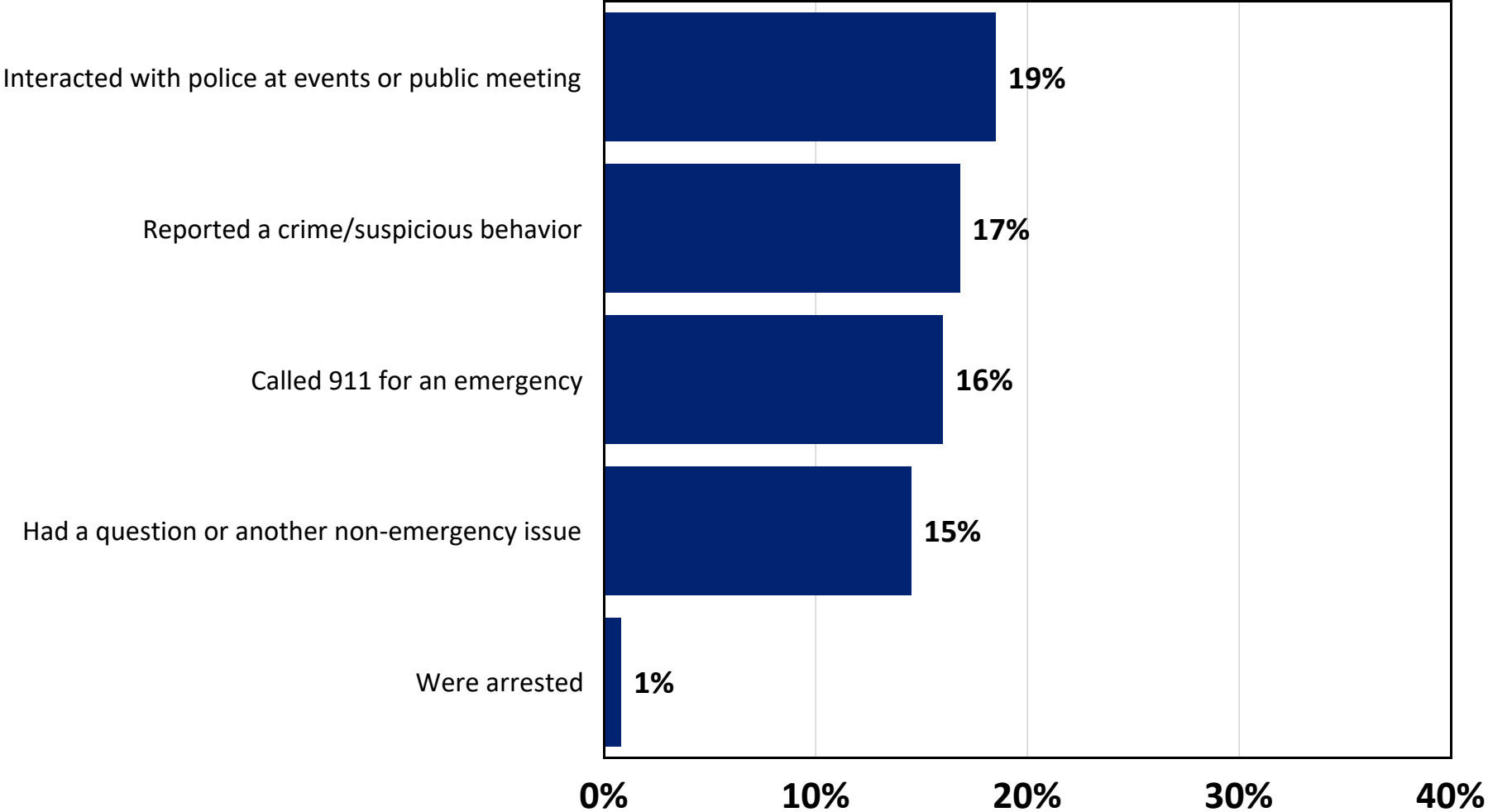
## Q4c. Do you think any of the following factors contributed to the reason you were stopped?

by percentage of respondents who indicated they had been stopped by a police officer during the past year (multiple selections could be made)



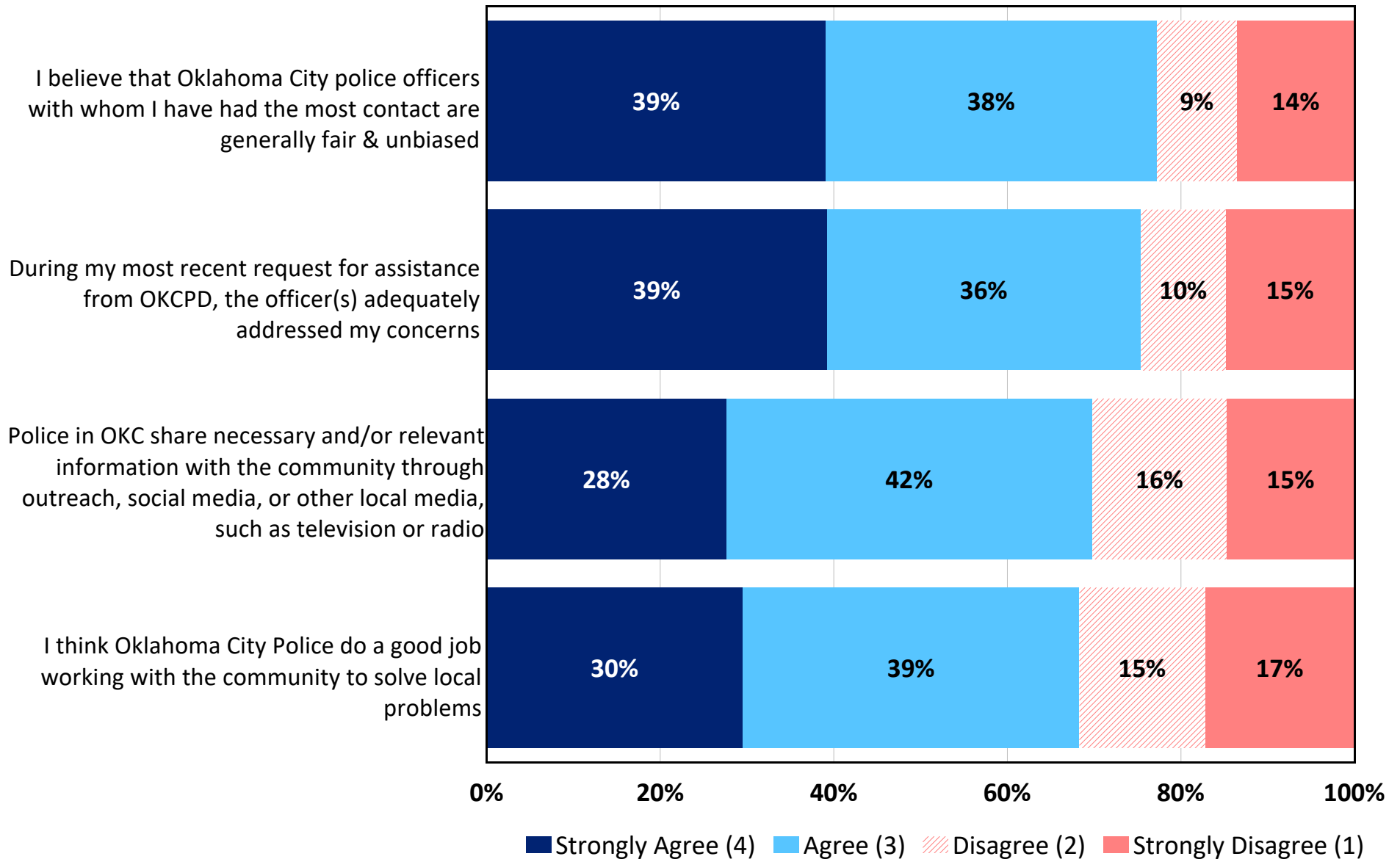
# Q5. Have you interacted with anyone from the Oklahoma City Police Department during the past year for any of the other reasons listed below?

by percentage of respondents (multiple selections could be made)



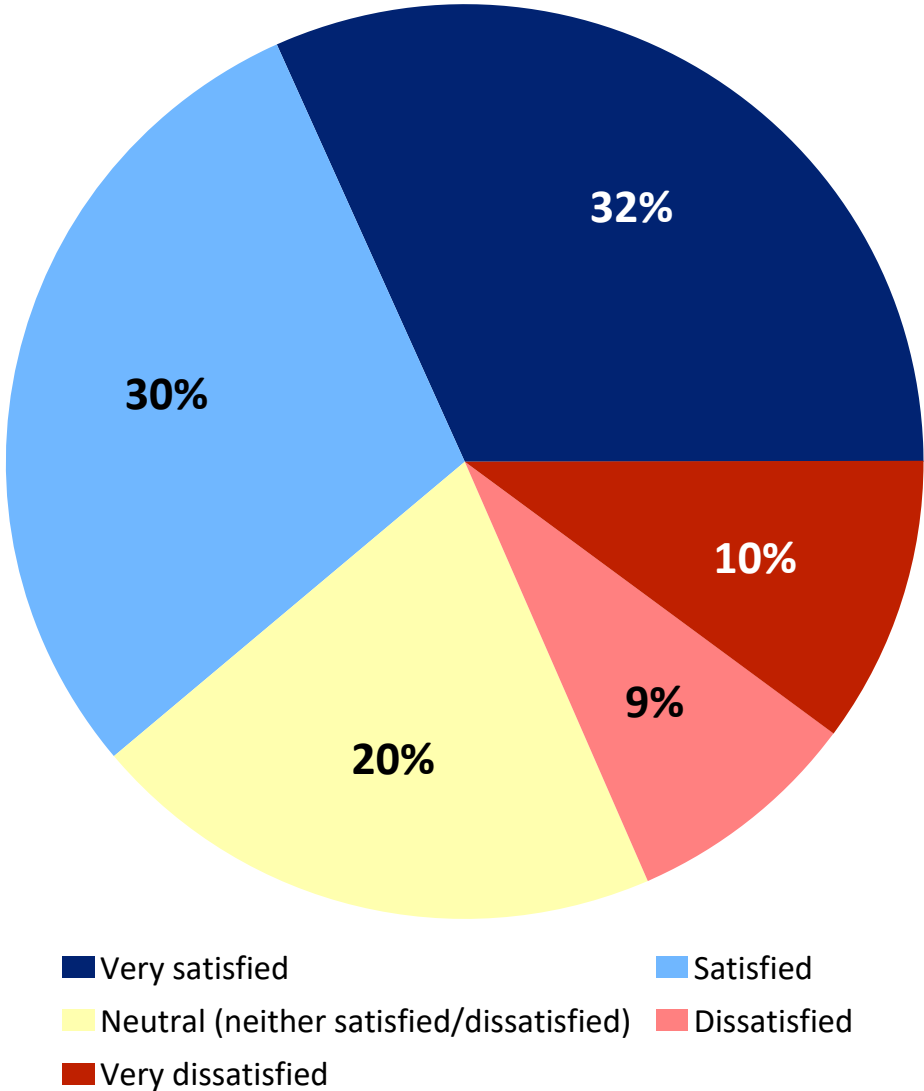
# Q6. Level of Agreement With the Following Statements:

by percentage of respondents (excluding “not applicable” or “don't know”)



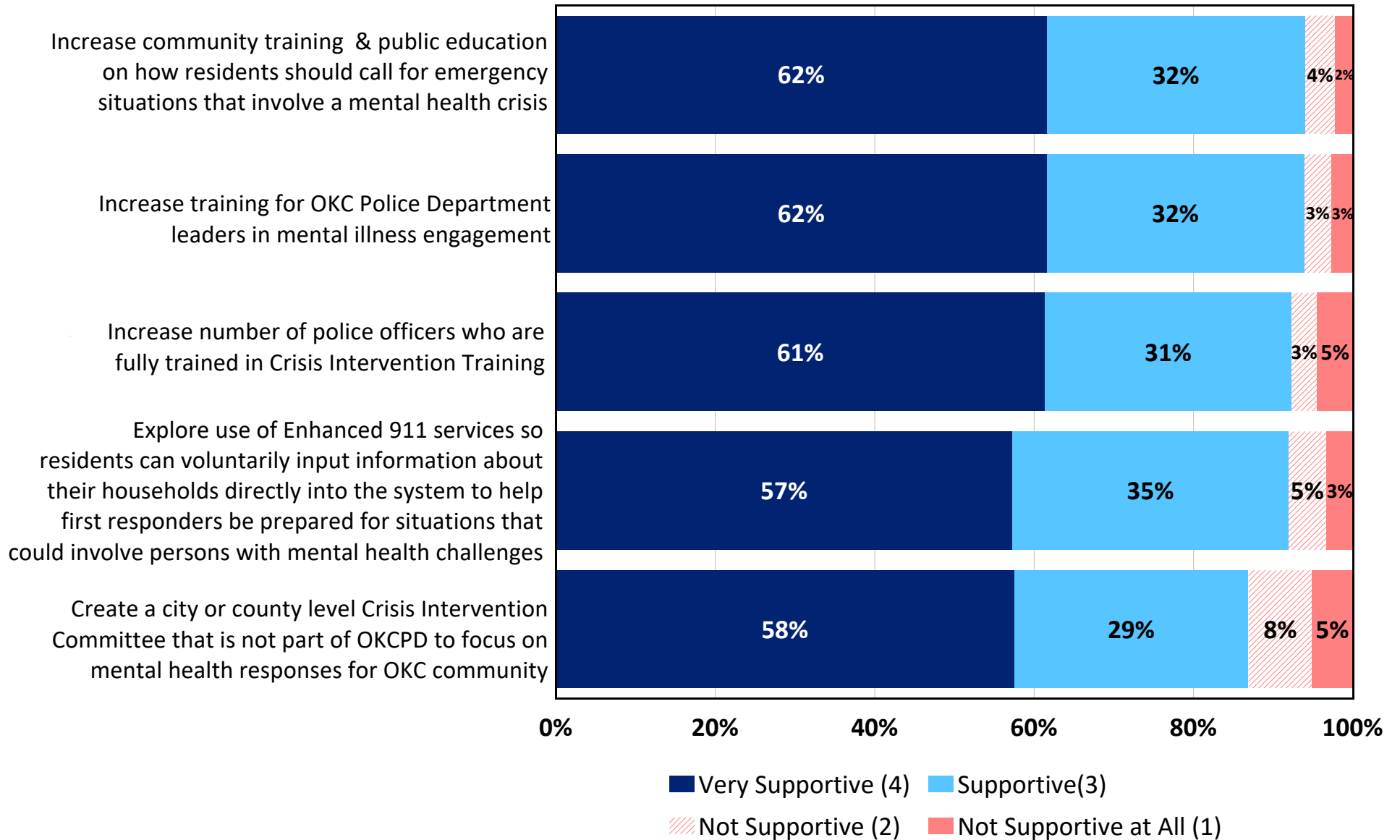
# Q7. Overall, how satisfied were you with your interaction(s) with OKC Police Department?

# Q8. Level of Support for Various De-Escalation Initiatives

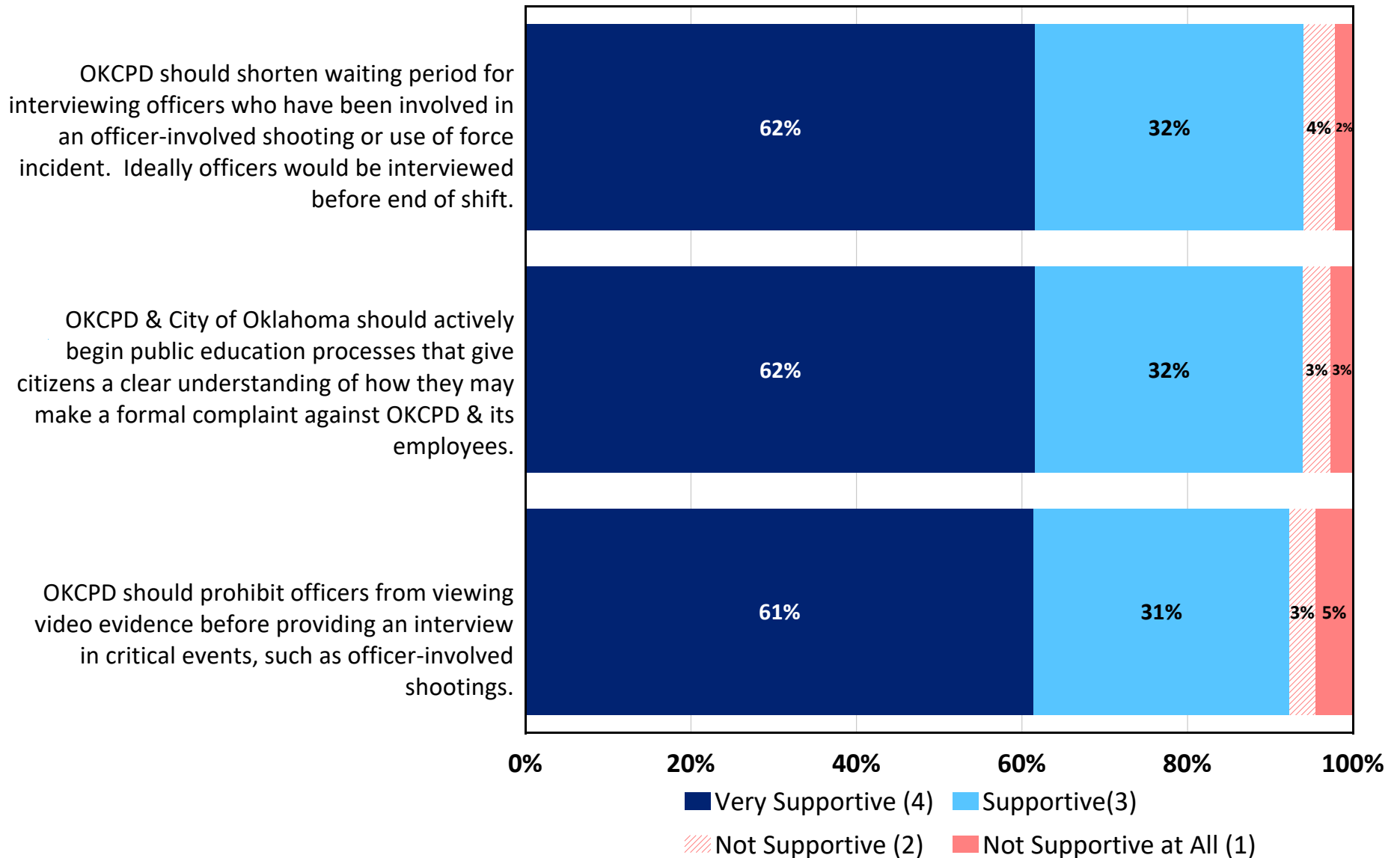
by percentage of respondents (excluding “not applicable” or “don't know”)





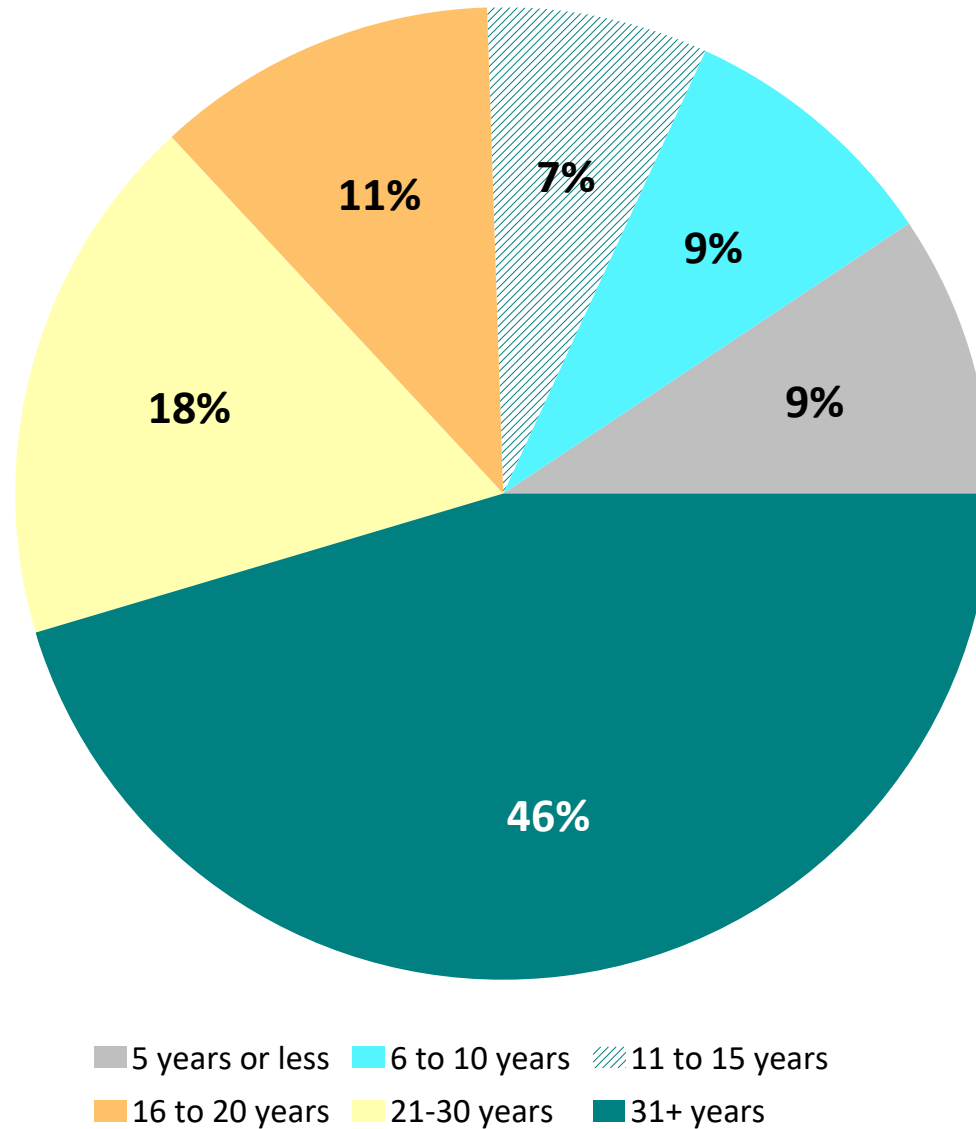
# Q9. Level of Support for Various Accountability Initiatives

by percentage of respondents (excluding “not applicable” or “don't know”)



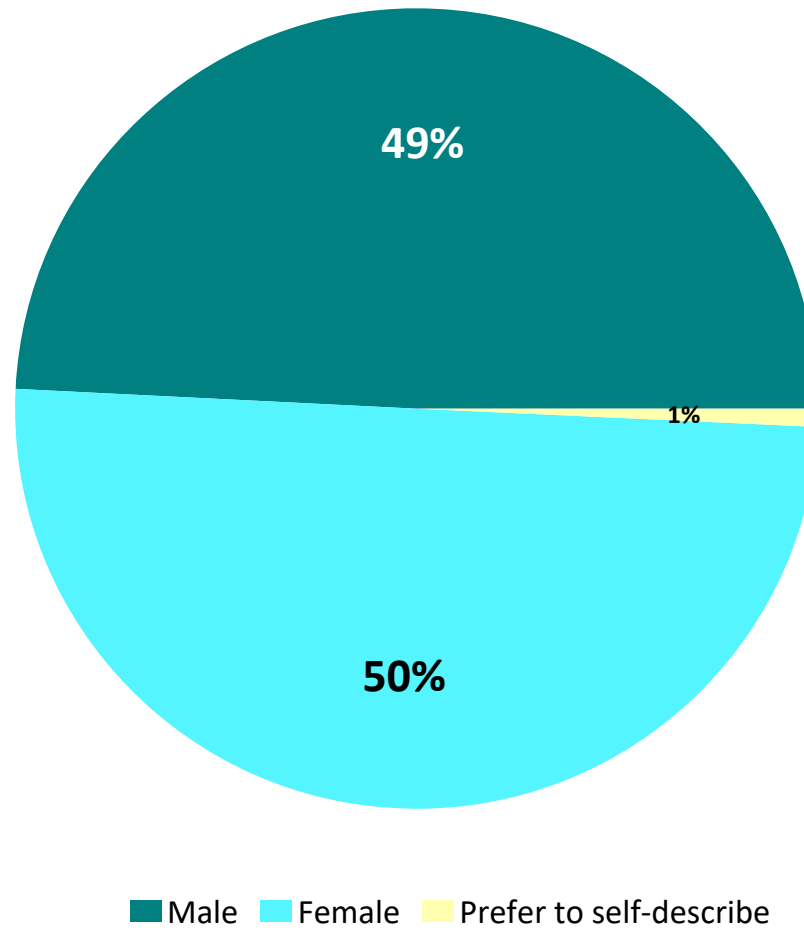
# Q10. How many years have you lived in Oklahoma City?

by percentage of respondents (excluding “not provided”)



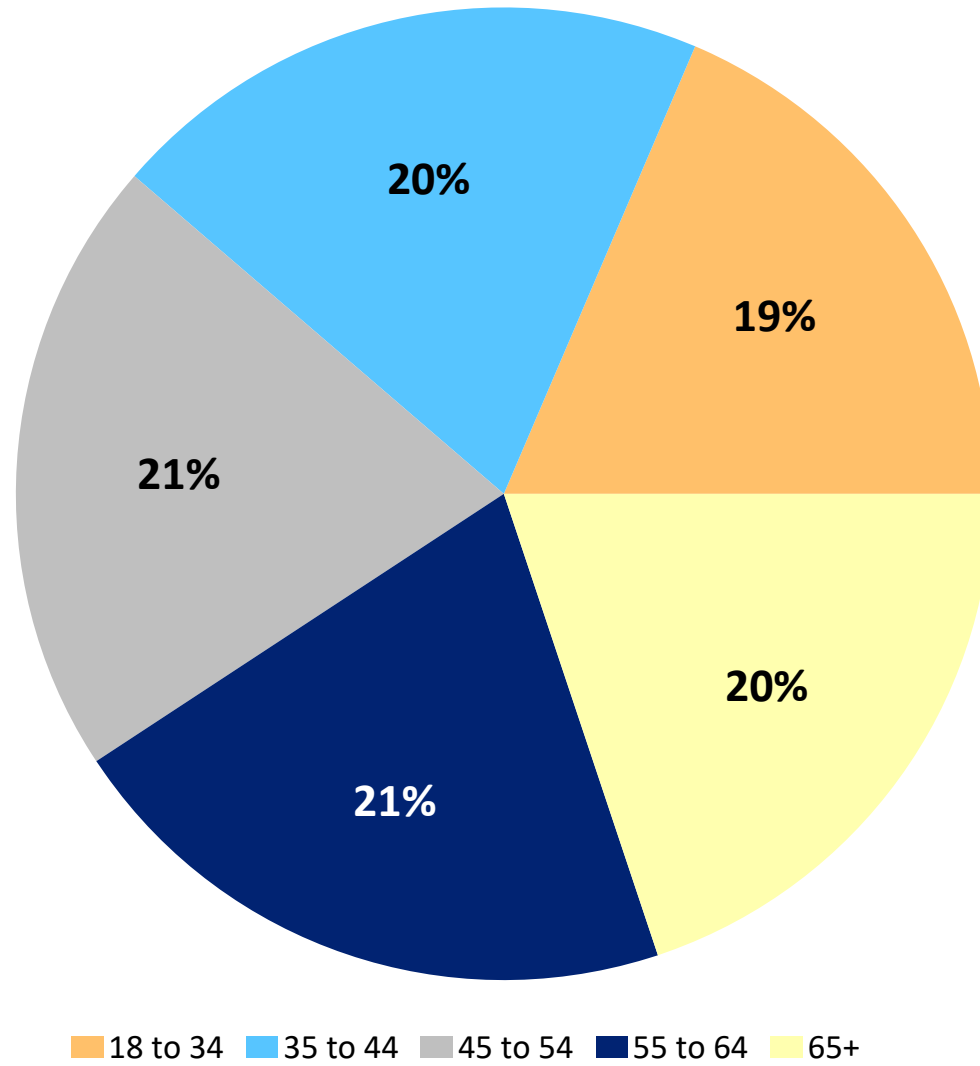
## Q11. What is your gender?

by percentage of respondents (excluding “prefer not to say”)



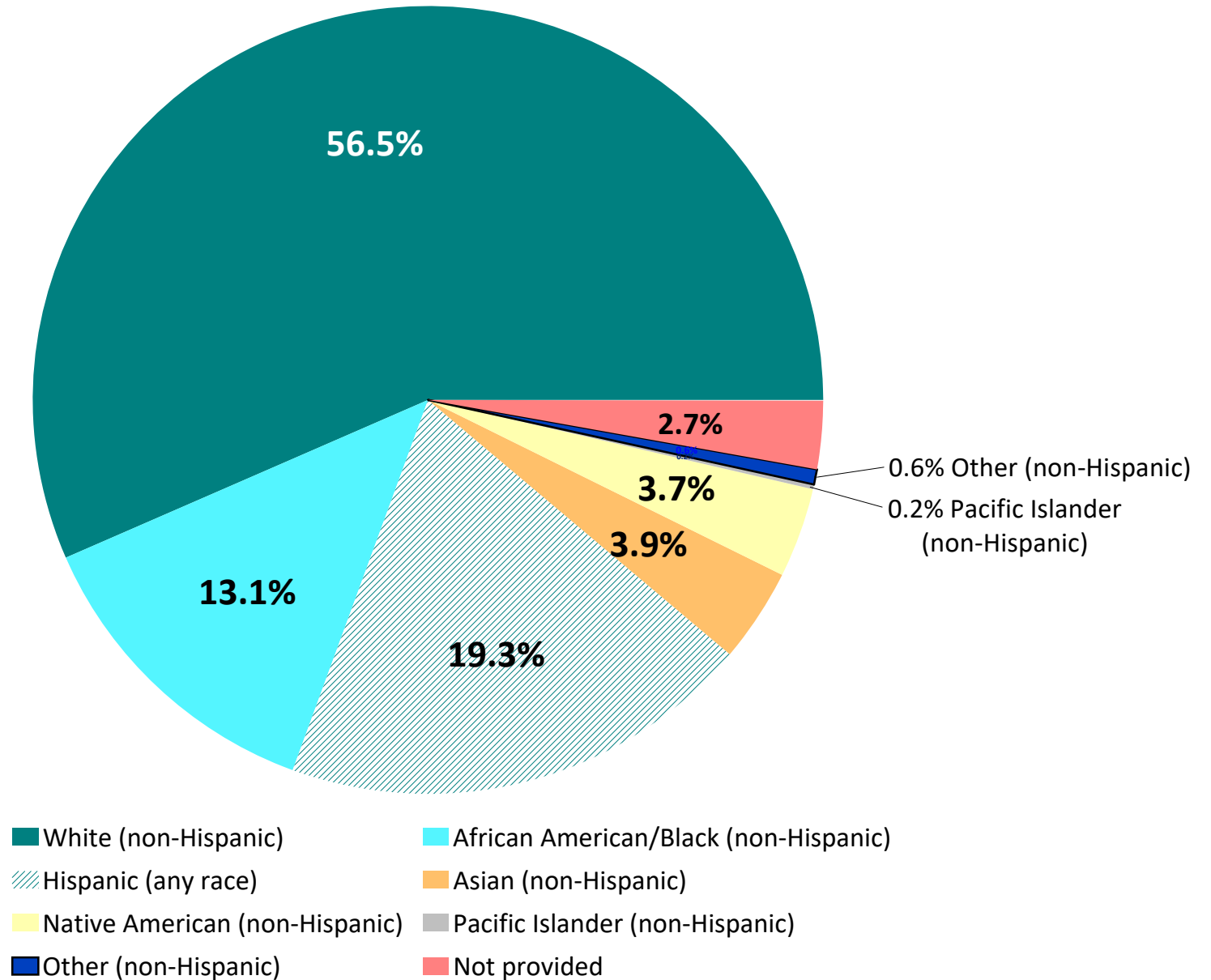
## Q12. What is your age?
