EMBARK revealed the City's first RAPID Bus Rapid Transit vehicle in June at the Oklahoma City Convention Center. The bus will travel along OKC's first RAPID line, which is expected to launch in 2023 in NW OKC. The line is planned to have 32 stops and stretch 9.5 miles each way. It will travel through the OKC downtown core to Classen Boulevard and along Northwest Expressway to Meridian. Over 20% of the region's jobs are located within a half-mile of the Northwest line, which is estimated to include roughly 91,000 jobs.

RAPID is a high-frequency service that will transport thousands of residents and employees to areas of interest by using advance technology and service models. Partial funding for the RAPID NW line comes from a Federal BUILD Grant with project assistance from the Oklahoma Department of Transportation and the Federal Transportation Administration. # Know your H20

Curious about Oklahoma City's drinking water? Visit okc.gov/ccr and read our Drinking Water Quality Report, also known as a Consumer Confidence Report. This report provides you with important information about the quality of your drinking water relating to all regulatory guidelines for 2021. It also provides information on our water sources, infrastructure and testing procedures. Last year, water quality staff tested more than 210,000 water samples from its treatment process and from 261 state-approved testing sites around the city. The Utilities Department has an outstanding record of providing clean, safe drinking water that meets or exceeds the regulatory guidelines set forth by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality. # Council adopts budget

In June, Oklahoma City Council adopted the City Manager's budget for fiscal year 2023, which began July 1. The City's total fiscal year 2023 budget is about \$1.8 billion, an increase of \$141.6 million compared to the FY 22 amended budget. The primary driver of the growth is the MAPS 4 Program fund, which increased by \$131.6 million to \$250.4 million. The General Fund, which pays for day-to-day operations, is budgeted at \$557.3 million, an increase of \$57.1 million (11.4%) compared to FY 22. The high level of growth is attributed to extraordinary growth in sales tax this year. The budget includes funding for 4,989 full-time positions, which is an increase of 123 positions (2.5%) from the FY 22 total. To view the budget book visit okc.gov/budget.

## Annual homeless count

More than 1,339 people were experiencing homelessness on the night of the City's annual Point in Time count conducted by the City, Homeless Alliance and volunteers in March. That number is down from 1,573 people counted in 2020 (The count was cancelled in 2021 due to the pandemic). While the number of people counted that single night decreased, it doesn't necessarily mean homelessness is down. Factors like the weather on the day of the count and counting strategies can cause numbers to fluctuate. See below for what the count found. # **USS OKC decommissioned**

The nuclear-powered attack submarine USS Oklahoma City (SSN 723) was decommissioned in May at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Washington, after more than 34 years of service. The Los Angeles-class fast attack submarine was commissioned July 9, 1988 and declared out of service Feb.10, 2022. At 361-feet long and displacing more than 6,900 tons, the USS Oklahoma City supported various missions, including anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface ship warfare, strike warfare and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance. USS Oklahoma City's notable deployments include the Mediterranean to participate in Operation Desert Shield, the Persian Gulf, Eastern Pacific and Guam. Efforts are underway to preserve the ship's sail and bring it back to OKC as a tribute to our naval history.
