LIBRARY SCULPTURE



Belle Isle Library, 5501 N Villa, is home to the City's newest artwork - an 8-foot-tall, 6.5-foot-wide powdercoated aluminum and glass sculpture titled Nourish. Emblazoned in the sculpture's design is an excerpt from U.S. Poet Laureate Joy Harjo's poem "Remember:" "You are this universe, and this universe is you."

The artist team is Manifold Creative Concepts, made up of Martin Donlin, Brett McDanel, Anton Morton and Joy Harjo, who is a member of the Mvskoke Nation and belongs to Oce Vpofv (Hickory Ground). The sculpture was funded from the City's 1% for the Arts ordinance.

Lower Scissortail Park

Everyone is invited to a city-wide celebration, September 23-25, to mark the opening of lower Scissortail Park and the completion of the 70-acre downtown oasis. Check scissortailpark.org for a list of weekend activities. The 30-acre lower park, which extends from SkyDance Bridge to SW 15th Street, features a promenade, walking trails, sports pavilion, two basketball courts, a soccer field, a futsal court, four pickleball courts, a nature playground, natural plantings and native wildflowers. Hundreds of new trees are planted throughout the lower park. Scissortail Park was funded through MAPS 3.

EMSAcare month

You can enroll or change your participation each September in the EMSAcare program, which provides permanent members of your household with emergency ambulance rides in the EMSA service area with no out-of-pocket cost, even if you don't have medical insurance. You can opt-in or out from Sept. 1-30 for the Oct. 1, 2022 to Sept. 30, 2023 time period. No action is required if you don't want to make a change. The membership fee is \$3.65 per month and is added to your monthly water bill. To change your participation, call Utilities Customer Service at (405) 297-2833 or visit to okc.gov/EMSAcare.

Airport rebounding

The City's Airports Department tracks the number of people flying out of Will Rogers World Airport (WRWA) each day. After experiencing a drastic decline in passenger activity due to COVID-19, enplanements are finally rebounding this year. In recent months, an average of 150,000 passengers per month flew out of OKC. The previous high was 185,000 per month in 2019. The number of passengers flying out of OKC reflects the economic activity in the community. When a community is growing and thriving, it attracts more airline activity. Clear your warrant

If you have a warrant for unpaid OKC tickets for a class "a" offense dated on or before June 30, 2020, you can clear it at a reduced cost until Dec. 31, 2022. You won't be arrested or go to jail. A qualifying overdue ticket could cost up to \$613 to resolve but may be resolved for \$155 through the program. Call (405) 297-3898 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. weekdays (except City-observed holidays) to pay your ticket or request a hearing about financial difficulties.

Utilities ratings reaffirmed

The City's Water Utilities Trust (OCWUT) has once again earned AAA and Aaa ratings from Standard & Poor's Global Ratings and Moody's Investor Services. The ratings place OCWUT among the top 7% and 5%, respectively, for municipal water and wastewater services. The high ratings are the result of the Utility's continued investment in its water supply, sustainability and infrastructure management programs. OCWUT is completing a 10-year, \$3.3 billion capital infrastructure program that includes the 100-mile, second Atoka pipeline, the Hefner-Draper interconnect project for water treatment redundancy, treatment plant improvements and residential line replacement programs.
