Murals: background

Q: Why do cities regulate murals?

- to support public safety;
- to affirm that the mural is not inappropriate or representing illegal activity;
- to distinguish between murals and other types of signs;
- to support code enforcement with vandalism and maintenance issues;
- to support design review districts.

Murals: existing definition

Uhi#kdswhu##Bgyhuwlyj#lqg#ljqv#6hilqlwlrqv#6515,

Mural means visual depictions and/or works of art including mosaic, painting or graphic art technique applied, painted, implanted or placed directly onto the exterior of any wall of a building; such depictions shall not contain words, logos, emblems, trademarks or other similar devices which identify or advertise any product, service or business. Provided, however, such depictions may include a signature or sponsor's identification area within the depiction so long as such area does not exceed ten percent of the total size of the depiction, or two and one-half percent of the surface area of the wall onto which it is attached or painted whichever is less. A mural shall not be considered an accessory or non-accessory sign; rather, a mural shall comply with the applicable standards set forth in Section 59-9350.46 of Chapter 59 of the Oklahoma City Municipal Code. A building, for purposes of this section only, shall mean any structure built for the support, shelter, or enclosure of persons, animals, chattels or movable property of any kind.





Murals: proposed definition

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Uhi#sursrvhq#8<04944<E1

Mural: One-of-a-kind visual depictions and/or works of art or licensed reproductions of original works of art including, but not limited to, mosaic, painting, or graphic art techniques that are applied, painted, implanted, or placed directly onto the exterior of any structure. This definition is not intended to discourage the use of new paint and printing technologies. [Reference: see Section 59-16112 of this Code.]

Murals: proposed approval process

- Arts Staff may approve murals that meet the standards.
- Arts Commission to review murals that don't meet the policy.
- Certificate of Approval is still required in design districts.
 - Staff may approve if murals meet district guidelines.
- **Sign permit required**. (Licensed sign contractor <u>only</u> required for mechanically-fastened materials.)



Murals: proposed standards for approval

- Content-neutral
- Public safety considerations
 - Securely attached
 - Does not interfere with public safety
 - Applied to a lawfully established structure and doesn't conflict with setbacks
- Application requirements
- Fee required

Murals: proposed text standards

- Continue to allow text up to 10% of the mural or 2.5% of the wall (up to maximum attached wall sign size)
- Arts Commission recommends text over 10% for final approval by Planning Director

Staff may approve murals in all design districts

What we've heard

Need to have more discussion with artists

Need to support artists

Need to support public art

Murals should not be considered "signage"

Murals should not be subject to the same regulations as signage

Consider impacts of regulations on free speech

Murals painted on private property should not need approvals or permits

There's too much paperwork and preparation for a mural/sign permit

Permits are too expensive

Permitting process takes too long
