

Spring Landscaping for Water Conservation



Add compost. Composting adds nutrients to your soil, helps it retain moisture, and helps keep food and yard waste out of the landfill.



Go native. Oklahoma native and adapted plants require less water than many common landscape selections. Check out the Plant Database on SqueezeEveryDrop.com to help choose the right plants for your garden conditions.



Plant nectar and pollen-rich flowers. Encourage bees and other pollinators to visit your garden all year round by growing a mix of plants with varying flowering times.



Apply mulch. Mulch is an attractive way to reduce evaporation and discourage weeds in your planting beds. Apply a layer two to three inches deep.



Skip watering if it has recently rained. Use a rain gauge to measure the amount of rain your landscape receives and adjust your sprinkler system accordingly. Visit SqueezeEveryDrop.com to learn more about adjusting your sprinkler system.
